Duarte High School: California Academic Decathlon State Champions

On March 7, a team of 15 Duarte High School students boarded a plane for Sacramento. The team was confident yet nervous, deter-

mined yet humble.

And with good reason; this
Duarte High School team was headed for the State Champion-ships. The Academic Decathlon State Championships, that is.

This competition consists of teams of students competing against each other, not for an hour or an afternoon, but over the span of two days.

The students compete in a variety of areas, including science, economics, art, speech, and a "super quiz". Only the top 55 schools in the state were invited to Sacramento.

Duarte was invited because we finished second in the County of Los Angeles Academic Decathlon finals on February 7, beating such powerhouse schools as Beverly Hills, Palos Verdes Peninsula, San Marino, La Canada, Arcadia, Glendora and Diamond Ranch.

In the regional competition, all of the schools competed against each other. In Sacramento, the schools were divided into three categories based on their size.

The small schools divi-

sion consisted of schools with fewer than 650 students, the medium schools division for schools of 650 to 1300 students, and the large school division for schools

of more than 1300 students. Our students competed in the medium schools division.

Duarte High School won their division, and they are the State Champions of the California Academic Decathlon Medium Schools Division

Duarte High currently has 1200 students. Of these, ap-proximately 68% are Hispanic, 10% are African American, are 12% Anglo, 4% Asian, and 3% Pilipino.

Duarte High consists of students from a number of cultures. Forty-three percent of the student body at Duarte High comes from households that are considered to be economically disadvantaged.

I only mention these statistics because occasionally Duarte High, and the entire community of Duarte for that matter, is seen as a place where education is not a

high priority.

Instead, it is perceived that we gather as a community only to discuss gang issues or shootings, as opposed to achievement. This is a challenging image to overcome.

The achievement of this Academic Decathlon Team is a wonderful example of the outstanding students we have in Duarte, and what can happen when students know that they are supported and respected.

The coach of the State Championship Academic Decathlon Team is Robert Grebel, and the

students are Arthur Amador, Christopher Amurao, Lucas Bondi, Daniel Colin, Talin Darkjian, Evan Finlay, Yonathan Lie-Chrianto, Gayle Manahan, Hayden McFarlane, Amber Nicholson, Vanja Primorac, Mozzum Saleem, Oliver Solorzano, Samantha Thomas, and Juan Urena.

Amber Nicholson took an individual gold medal in the peech category, and Hayden McFarlane took bronze in the

science category.

Of these 15 students, two are

sophomores, two are juniors, and are seniors. The students are Hispanic, Caucasian, Pilipino, Asian, and Armenian.

Next year, as college fresh-men, these Duarte High graduates will be attending UCLA, USC, BYU, Long Beach State, Stanford, and either Harvard or Yale. They have very bright futures, and they have worked tirelessly to get to this point.

Their teachers and their parents have also worked very hard, and should be recognized for their

commitment to these kids.

Great things are happening in Duarte and at Duarte High. We are very proud of all of our

students.
We celebrate our diversity, and we know that we are richer because of what we can learn from each other.

We have placed the value of student success in a culture of caring and respect at the top of our priority list.
We are confident that we have

our priorities in the right order.

Here are some key points about the project to use either at the meeting or in written correspondence.

In terms of readiness (en-

vironmental clearance, level of engineering and design, municipal/public review and support), the Foothill Extension is ahead of all regional light rail projects under consideration for funding in Los Angeles County.

• In terms of population and employment, the San Gabriel Valley is the fastest growing region

in Los Angeles County.

• The San Gabriel Valley is the only sector of Los Angeles County without a mass transit alternative.

• \$28 million has already been invested toward the implementa-tion of this project. None of these funds were allocated through METRO funding.

• Over \$2 billion of public and private investment has already been committed to Transit Oriented Developments throughout the Foothill Extension corridor.

• A total economic develop-ment benefit of \$43.5 billion is projected over the period from 2008 to 2030 in the form of private investment, household spending,

and increased property taxes.

• The Construction Authority's capital request of \$80 million, which can leverage \$320 million in federal support to complete Phase 2(A), is just over one-half of one percent of the total County Rail and Transitway Capital budget in the current Long-Range Transportation Plan.

"We need to invest in our

social capital. But we need to have a sustainable, strategic, comprehensive plan to deal with this problem and break the cycle," said Duarte Mayor Phil Reyes who spearheaded the meeting.
Participants included Monro-

via Mayor Rob Hammond, Mon-rovia/Arcadia/Duarte (MAD) Town Council Chairman David Hall, Duarte City Manager Darrell George, Monrovia City Manager Scott Ochoa, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Captain Richard Shaw, Monrovia Police Chief Roger Johnson, Duarte Public Safety Di-rector Brian Villalobos, as well as representatives for County Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich and State Senator Gloria Romero

"We don't need a menu of programs. We need first and foremost coordination and collaboration and a long term commitment to the problem, a minimum of 10 years. Gang violence is cyclical," said Tony Massengale, a gang prevention coordinator and 30year veteran of the Los Angeles County Human Relations Commission. "We have to break the cycle, yes. Arrest, yes. But who will fill the vacuum?" he asked.

Some of those present pointed to programs directed to kids and families. GRIP, an award-winning gang prevention/intervention program in the City of Paramount targets kids as early as the second grade to "plant seeds that gang activity is not for them" and educates parents about basic gang activities, gang clothing that can mark their kids to be jumped into gangs and things they can do to keep kids from joining gangs.

We have to go to the root of the problem, look at the cause and stop putting on the band-aids," said Natalie Salazar, director of the Community Law Enforce-ment Partnership Program of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, who moderated the meeting.

Parent patrols, increased Neighborhood Watch participa-tion, job training and placement

of high-risk youth are ways that the community can take part in the short term and long-term solution. "There is a role for everyone," said Salazar

"This collaboration is so necessary to handle the issue that we face. Now is the time for implementation," said MAD Town Council's Chairman Hall, who noted that county area residents are also mobilizing and banding together to make their streets safer. More than 100 people turned out recently in the county area for a Neighborhood Watch meeting.
The most immediate response

has been to quell the violence with 'unprecedented law enforcement resources in the area," according to Sheriff's Captain Shaw - a combined law enforcement task force "to put an end to the violence" that includes District Attorney, federal agencies, police departments from surrounding cities, 37 Sheriff's deputies from Temple Station, Operation Safe Street deputies, four homicide teams, a dedicated sergeant and detective, 17 officers from the Monrovia Police Department and supervisor and 17 California Highway Patrol officers.
As of March 6, the effort

had resulted in 169 arrests, 44 searches, 31 parole searches, 23 firearms recovered and 422 interview reports.

But all acknowledge that the real work will have to be done by the people in the communities themselves

"I feel a different vibe in the room today that the endless cycle that is feeding the gangs is going to be addressed. Something different is going to bring the gang cycle to an end," said Shaw.

Duarte Unified School District Superintendent Dean Conklin noted that the schools are working hard to ensure that the campuses remain safe from gang violence. The district meets monthly with the Sheriff's Dept. and Duarte Public Safety. There are graffiti removal programs on all cam-puses, character education starts at the elementary school level, campus programs go beyond the normal school day to 6 p.m. The high school has partnered with Citrus College to offer college level classes on campus. There is also a college program at Citrus for Mt. Olive students. At Parent night on the Internet and on campus, "parents are asked to dream what they want for their kids and then we make it happen," said Conklin. "We are raising up kids who have dreams to go to college and own their own businesses. But we don't have all the answers. We're open to ideas," he said.

"What concerns me is that with all the resources we have, some how we're missing the boat," said Duarte City Councilwoman Lois Gaston. "There is a part of our population this is missing the boat. Nobody wants to hire that kid who comes out of jail. We have to get around that socio-economic divide."

Fr. Charles Ramirez of Immaculate Conception Church in Monrovia, one of several clergy who participated in the meeting talked about how the churches in the community have come to-

gether to work on the problem. "We're breaking down denominational walls, ethnic walls. I remind my parishioners that violence is a sin. We need to promote a culture of life not of death. Peace starts in the home with the parents. It all starts with forgiveness and love," he said.

Citrus provides career training in the public works and water sectors Financial Assistance Program

As concerns regarding the nation's economy grow and unem-ployment numbers rise, is offering a specialized training program for individuals seeking a career or promotion within the public

works and water industries.
With median hourly earnings for public works and water professions, such as highway maintenance workers and water systems operators, ranging from \$20 to \$26 an hour and supervisor salaries ranging from \$50,000 to \$85,000 annually, these are high-

wage/growth careers. Citrus was awarded a \$213,000 grant from the Economic and Workforce Development branch of the California Community College Systems Office in order to upgrade the skills of workers

in our community.

Citrus has formed a partnership with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works, Pasadena Public Works Department, and Pasadena Water and

These employers have com-

mitted a total of \$243,000 in inkind services, including employee release time, to attend classes.

In addition to regularly scheduled public works classes held at and online classes, Citrus now offers public works and water technology classes at these employer sites to provide education to their

workers already in the field. Employers select the public works and water classes that will benefit their employees.

Classes are applicable to the Citrus College Public Works and Water Technology Certificates and the Associate of Science Degree in Applied Arts for Public Works or Water Technology.

Employees receiving training through can climb the water or public works career ladder and improve their eligibility for promotion and pay increase.

Employers will benefit from an improved skill level of their workforce.

Citrus has also worked with the East San Gabriel Valley ROP to develop a new class to introduce high school students to careers in public works and water

technology.

This class includes projects and worksite learning with public works and water employer part-ners. High school students who complete the class will receive assistance submitting an online application to as well as registering for the water and public works programs at Citrus, preparing them for entry-level jobs.
The International Society of

Arborists has approved to award 30 units of continuing education to students who successfully complete the Municipal and Urban Tree Care class offered at the Pasadena Public Works Department.



Roadway Work Scheduled

The City of Duarte recently awarded project "Royal Oaks Drive and Mount Olive Drive Pavement Rehabilitation" to All American Asphalt of Corona, California. Duarte Council Member Paras-Caracci Featured in New Video

Paras-Caracci is featured in a new video launched today by the National League of Cities (NLC) as part of "American Cities '08, the Road to the White House Runs Through America's Hometowns". a focused effort to raise the voice and concerns of cities in the ongoing presidential campaign.

The video, now airing on www.americancities08.org and on YouTube, asks a series of tough questions of the candidates and identifies seven core policy areas where cities want to work with the next President and Congress. In addition to the video, the campaign includes a new website and publications that can be used by local officials in candidate forums, town hall meetings, with local media, or in any session with the candidates.

Paras-Caracci is on the NLC Board of Directors and chairs the CityFutures Panel on Democratic Governance. In the video, she discusses the need for candidates to address poverty in this country.

"We are at an important crossroads in our history," said Cynthia McCol-lum, NLC president and Madison, Ala., council member. "Hometown issues are national issues. Public Safety 2007 in Review

By Brian Villalobos Director of Public Safety Coordination

In 2007, the City of Duarte reported a 4% decrease in Part 1 crimes from 2006. Although the crime drop may seem small, the highest decrease reported by Duarte residents was in violent crimes or crimes against persons.

Violent Crimes include assaults, which dropped approximately 30% compared to 2006 and is the lowest number ever recorded in the City of Duarte. Only five years ago, 78 assaults were recorded (2001). Robbery (or taking property by force) was down 34% since 2006.

Property crime has shown a different pattern in our City. Vehicle burglaries in 2007 totaled 97, demonstrating a 23 % decrease from 119 in 2006. However, the months of November and December 2007 showed indications of an increase in vehicle burglaries.

This trend goes hand in hand with the holidays, as thieves look for a quick way to make a buck. The majority of vehicle burglaries occur when burglars enter an unlocked, or open door, or window.

Auto thefts were also down in 2007. Eighty-five vehicles were reported stolen, a 7% decrease from 2006 91 stolen vehicles.

Residential Burglaries increased dramatically in 2007, from the 2006 all time low of 25 to 48 in 2007. This increase was felt all along the Foothill cities. With the help of Neighborhood Watch a serial burglar was arrested and this individual faces 7 years 10 months behind bars. Neighborhood Watch in Duarte is an essential part of law enforcement. Thank you Neighborhood Watch Volunteers!

In the month of December, one murder took place in the City, and in and around that time there was

an increase in gang violence in the Monrovia-Duarte Area. In the month of January a special task force was implemented to combat the recent flare of gang violence. The team is made up of members of the L.A. District Attorney's Office, federal agencies, police departments from surrounding cities, 37 Sheriff's deputies from Temple Station, Operation Safe Street deputies, four homicide teams, a dedicated sergeant and detective, and 17 officers from the Monrovia Police Department including their supervisor, as well as 17 California Highway Patrol officers. The effort has so far resulted in 169 arrests, 44 searches, 31 parole searches, 23 firearms recovered and 422 interview reports.

The safety of Duarte's residents is of utmost importance to the Duarte Public Safety Department, LA County Sheriff Department, and the City of Duarte's elected officials.

Although many plans can take effect, it is the residents in the community who must take a stand and get involved in their community to make any plan work. We all want and deserve a safe neighborhood. Get involved! Stay informed! Take a Stand Against Violence!

He would like to remind residents to pay close attention to the speed limits around their community and especially around school zones. Drive safe and pay attention to pedestrians and traffic laws. Remember safety is a priority and although it is an old saying we must not forget, "Click it or ticket".


Search for New **Citrus College** Superintendent/ **President Intensifies**







A day in the life

Greatness begins here! That is Beardslee School's motto. A typical week at Beardslee can give you some insight as to why I believe it to be true. Come with me and visit the greatness that can be found on Kellwill Way!

Pick any morning. The bell rings at 8:15 a.m. and students and teachers move to their classrooms where school begins at 8:20 sharp. First on the agenda is the pledge of allegiance over the loudspeaker. Each day, two students lead the school in our salute to the flag. Immediately following, a staff member reads the Words of Wisdom, based on one of the character traits. This morning, Mrs. Valerie Durham shares some thoughts on respect. Teachers follow up with a short class discussion on the values presented each morning and ask students to think about how they can live the trait.

8:30 rolls around and it is time for Oral Language Development. Students move to different classes assigned by their level of proficiency in English. Teachers instruct students in improvement in English, school-wide until 9:00 a.m. At 9:00 a bell rings signaling the time to move back to their homerooms for English Language Arts. Again, some students move to work with our Mrs. Cynthia Wells, our Literacy Coach, or to Miss Danielle Vollers, our Special Education Teacher. All students focus on reading and writing using the state standards, as a guide

the state standards, as a guide.

If the day is Tuesday, grade levels report to the black top so that they can participate in our Physical Education program. All students, K-6, receive an hour of instruction from our PE teacher, Mr. Smith, and Steve Venegas, Duarte's Promise fellow. As the students develop their physical abilities, teachers meet by grade level and are joined by Mr. Moses, the Outreach Consultant, Mrs.

Wells, and me so that we can collaborate on ways in which to improve student achievement. Assessment data is analyzed, strategies are shared, and teachers talk about what is working!

Recesses are lively times at any school. At Beardslee, not only do you see our able Proctors monitoring student play, but we have additional help from our Peer Mediators. Students in 4-6 grades are taught Peer Mediation techniques by Mrs. Angie Salas and Miss Veronica Martinez. They take their skills to the playground and assist students with problem solving.

11:00 a.m. is math time! Stu-

11:00 a.m. is math time! Students are given direct instruction on the state standards to improve their mathematical thinking and computation. In our first grade classes, Cognitive Guided Instruction takes students to new levels of thinking. Students can be seen solving math problems in ways that they can explain.

At 11:30 our lunch schedule begins. Students have the option of getting food from the cafeteria or choosing items from our salad bar. Mrs. Maria Pender, cafeteria manager, and her staff ensure that all have healthy food and all enjoy. On a recent Friday, our Safari Reading Club held the second party of the year during lunch. All students who had read for twenty minutes every day since September were invited for a nacho lunch and DJ Party. 375 students participated in this lovely but noisy celebration!

The afternoons are devoted to the content areas of Social Studies and Science. Teachers ably instruct student incorporating art and music into the afternoon subject areas. Another session of Physical Education is completed some afternoons.

School is dismissed at 2:42; however that is not the end of many students'day. More than 80 students participate in our Think Together program, coordinated by Richard Thoele. Think Together runs until 6:00 p.m. every evening. Students are given time to complete their homework with the tutoring skills of the program leader. Additionally students

Karina Avila our music teacher teaches 2nd through 4th grade students how to read music and play the piano. It's not uncommon to hear the children talk about classical composers, and the parts of a sonata. How many of us know the meaning of exposition, development, and recapitulation? Maxwell students do.

These same students enhance their mathematical reasoning by playing a variety of computerized mathematical games. When you visit the lab you see a little penguin that runs up and down and across the screen. Gigi the penguin is estimating, calculating and predicting as it moves through a variety of obstacle courses. All the while this little penguin "Gigi" is controlled by the student. Students are developing critical thinking and mathematical reasoning as they "play" these games.

What else does Maxwell have that you would think is unique to a private school. Christine Montgomery, Lynette Bridges, and Claudia Flores and first grade teachers; Louise Bayer, Rosemarie McLain, and Maryann Volmert give their students open ended problems to solve. Sounds like work? Not really. Students are laughing and enjoying their conversations with other students as they figure out the answers to the math problems. Students do this as they manipulate plastic teddy bears, buttons and cubes.

This teaching method is known as Cognitively Guided instruction or CGI and instructors must be well trained and understand child development. That is why our teachers are very special.

Our reading incentive program could win honors. This program, Reading counts, motivates readers. It begins with great books.

participate in physical activity and the final hour is spent enriching their academics with further experiences. In addition to Think Together, Beardslee offers After the Bell classes on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These extended learning opportunities in math assist students in meeting the grade level criteria.

But the school doesn't close at 6:00! Night classes in English anguage Development are offered to adults wanting to improve their English. Wednesday night the Ballet Folklorico group run by Mrs. Figueroa meets on our stage to dance the evening away! Migrant Education holds parent information meetings. The class will be housed at our Andres Duarte site and will operate in the morning, with extended day opportunities from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our largest preschool program is our **Duarte State Preschool**

which serves 168 preschoolers and their families. State Preschool is funded by a grant through the California Department of Education with the goal of preparing students for kindergarten. Children in our State Preschool program need to be three or four years old by December 2, and need to meet the income eligibility criteria. We have both morning and afternoon State Preschool classes at Beardslee and Andres Duarte and an afternoon class at Maxwell

afternoon class at Maxwell.

Duarte Head Start serves 88 Duarte families. Head Start is funded through a grant with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Head Start. It is a fully subsidized child development program with a strong a social services mandate, working with the entire family and establishing family goals for all participants. Head Start is designed to serve the neediest children in the community. In fact we are mandated to serve a certain number of children who have disabilities. Our Head Start classes are located on the Beardslee, Andres Duarte and Maxwell campuses. At this time all Head Start classes are morning classes.

"Lessons to teach our children"

Having been a resident of Duarte for the past 40 years, it saddens me to see the violence that is going on in our community at this time. This past February, I attended the funeral services for one of the victims, a young man who was in the first seventh grade class that I had here at Northview.

Brandon Lee graduated last year from Duarte High School, a highly popular young man, who was the captain of the football team and my son's classmate.

The loss of any human life due to senseless violence is always painful, but this one hit especially close to

During the viewing, when I approached the casket to pay my respects I was overwhelmed by his obvious youth. His face was beautiful and smooth and devoid of any wrinkles, he had not been given the opportunity to live long enough to earn his wrinkles.

Amidst all of the sadness in the church, it was this loss of opportunity that struck me the most. He never had the opportunity to complete college, play pro football, enjoy one more holiday season with his family. or earn his wrinkles. As a member of this community and a caretaker of its youth, I struggled to understand what I or for that matter any of us can do to help put an end to this violence that is destroying our peace of mind and our youth.

So forgive me if this news article is not focused on the particular events occurring at Northview, but rather focuses on what we all can do to help make our wonderful city safe again and how we can protect our most valued resource, our children.

Below I have listed some points that may help us through these difficult times, I hope they help.

1. Know that your children are safe at our schools.

Every school site has safety procedures inclusive of carefully monitoring every one who attempts to enter our campuses. Reassure your children that they are safe at school. School is one of the safest places to be.

2. Keep in mind that these have been incidents of gang violence. It is important however to note that not

all victims have had direct gang affiliations.

3. Make arrangements about how your son/daughter will get to and from school. If possible pick them up and drop them off or ask a neighbor, friend or family member to help you with this. If your child(ren) has/have to walk to and from school, discuss which are the safest routes to follow. Check with the schools regarding after school programs where your student can be supervised by responsible adults while completing homework and engaging in other extra-curricular activities. Many of these programs are free.

4. If at all possible *avoid being at or near residences* or other locations that are often visited by gang members. Although not all of the victims have had gang affiliations, many have been near locations that gang members frequent.

5. Do not allow your children to walk around the community unescorted, especially in areas that you

6. Be aware of who your son/daughter associates with and know where he or she is at all times. Get to know their friends and the parents of their friends. Teenagers might view this as nosey or intrusive, too bad, stay the course, and let them know that being informed about their whereabouts and who they are with is a non-negotiable part of your parental responsibilities.

7. Do not allow your children to dress in gang attire. Often our sons/daughters will insist that what they are wearing is just fashionable not representative of gang clothing. Help them understand that the clothing might mistakenly identify them as gang members and place them at risk. Educate yourself about the trends in gang attire.

8. Through frequent dialoguing make sure that

your children know that the police are here to serve

nd protect us as community members. Encourage them to report to you any illegal activity they might inadvertently witness or suspect is occurring.

9. Purposefully engage your children in positive activities such as sports, youth clubs, religious training and activities. Intentionally and consistently help them make connections with the type of individuals you believe will cast a positive influence on them.

10. Be intolerant of gang activity in your neighborhood, get together with neighbors and form a Neighborhood Watch group. Do not take unnecessary risks but report to the authorities any issues of concern. Reporting can occur anonymously, use this to your advantage. (To make anonymous reports call the Duarte Sheriff's substation at 626-357-7938 ext. 462.)

As I conclude this article I want to make it clear that none of us has all of the answers but certainly one of the strongest deterrents for preventing this type of devastating criminal activity lies within the lessons we teach our youth directly through our words and indirectly through our actions.

We must explicitly teach our children to resolve their conflicts with others by using the power of their words and not physical aggression. The acts that many gang members inflict upon others are a result of many little lessons that they learned at home and on the streets while growing up. They learned well the lessons about retribution, vengeance, the use of force and intolerance, all of which abound in our society.

It is the responsibility of parents and the guardians of our youth, which all of us are, to teach the right lessons that focus on compassion, understanding, tolerance, and the power of dialogue in resolving conflicts.

Can you commit day after day to stepping up to the plate to help support and shape the character of our youth? If aloud or in your mind you just said "Yes!" then find the manner in which you can most effectively serve, and start today.

Continuation Program

This high school diploma program has been developed for students' ages 16 through 18 whom have not been successful at the comprehensive high school. Students who are considerably behind in credits and/or who have had behavior challenges at the comprehensive high school may be transferred, involuntarily, to the continuation program at Mt. Olive High School, Students can remain in this program or "earn" their way back to the high school. Parents may also voluntarily place their child in Mt. Olive.

Dropout Prevention (SB 65)

This high school diploma program has been developed to assist students "at risk" of dropping out of high school. The Outreach Program is open to all high school students. Students are placed in the program after all other interventions at the high school have failed. Students can remain in the program or "earn" their way back to the high school.

Dropout Recovery (Alternative Education Outreach Program)

This high school diploma program has been developed to assist students who have already dropped out of school. The AEOP program is a state dropout recovery program.

The AEOP program is open to students who have been out of school for at least 45 days. Students can remain in the program until they receive their high school diploma.

6th Grade Suspended Expulsion Program

This limited program has been developed to offer Grade 6 students an alternative to expulsion. Placement is ordered by the Board of Education. The curriculum taught is equivalent to that offered at the regular sixth grade program. Students will remain in the program for the extent of the period of suspended expulsion. **7th and 8th Grade**

Opportunity Program

This grade 7/8 opportunity program has been developed to assist students who have not been successful at the intermediate school. Students who are not succeeding academically or who have become "challenging" at their school may be transferred to the Opportunity Program at Mt. Olive High School. Students are placed in the program after all other interventions have failed. The curriculum offered is equivalent to that offered at the intermediate school. Students will remain in the program for at least one semester and must "earn" their way back to their home school.

9th Grade Opportunity Program

This grade 9 opportunity program has been developed to assist students who have not been successful at the high school. Students who are not succeeding academically or who have become "challenging" at their school may be transferred to the Opportunity Program at Mt. Olive High School. Students are placed in the program after all other interventions have failed. The curriculum offered is equivalent to that offered at the high school Students will remain in the program for at least one semester and must "earn" their way back to their home school.

Adult Education

This high school diploma program has been developed for students ages 18 through adult who have not received their high school diploma. Students receive instruction in all subjects needed in order to earn their high school diploma, Anyone eighteen (18) or older may enroll in this program. For more information call (626) 599-5902.

Independent Study Program

This limited high school diploma program is reserved for students whose life circumstances make it impossible for them to attend school on a regular basis. Students receive weekly assignments, must agree to complete 20 hours of work at home and must check in with the school one hour each week

Regional Occupational Program (ROP)

The Regional Occupational Program provides tuition free, hands-on job training for high school students and adults. Students may enroll in ROP classes at Mt. Olive, Duarte High School, or another district. Because ROP is a job-training program, students are not paid while attending these classes but receive experience and high school credit toward graduation. ROP also offers the opportunity to learn while you earn. If you are working, you may enroll in a Cooperative Vocational Education (CVE) class. You will work your normally assigned hours, learn on the job and attend classes once a week. High school students can earn credits toward graduation for time spent on the job as well as for classroom experiences.

SUPPORT PROGRAM SERVICES

AB 1802 Counseling Services

Every student is guaranteed counseling services that include academic planning, registration review, credit checks, Indi-vidual Learning Plans, personal counseling, parent information, college counseling, financial aid planning, career counseling, and graduation checks. If students require services above and beyond that which the school can supply, the staff will refer students to the appropriate agencies. The staff at Mt. Olive is working hard to develop a program of Integrated

Services that will be available to all students and their families.

Learning for Life

Learning for Life field trips and group activities blend character development, career edu-cation, life skills, and academic learning into a comprehensive program geared to reinforce social skills, critical and creative thinking, ethical decision making, conflict resolution, and self-esteem. The programs aim is to prepare tomorrow's workforce through exposure to career management activities and skills.

Citrus College Noncredit Counseling and Matriculation

Noncredit Counseling is free of charge and provides CAHSEE utoring, academic tutoring, individual skills assessment, ESL classes, career/occupational counseling, academic advisement, personal counseling, support and parenting skills groups and various workshops. Classes are held at Mt. Olive and Citrus

D.A.R.T. (Duarte Area Resource Team)

D.A.R.T., in conjunction with California PAL, sponsors the "Life After High School Program". The program takes 9th-11th grade high school students on a field trip to California State University at Fresno and engages them in 3 days of workshop topics dealing with college life, applying for financial aide, life skills, job opportunities, apprenticeships, college selection and much more.

Career Planning

Career Planning is available to all students. Students have the opportunity to attend the DHS Career Expo and career fairs at Citrus College. All students will receive a copy of the Los Angeles County ROP Career and College Planning Guide. Career planning




