Legislative Ratings

Chamber Ratings Reflect Active Legislative Sessions, Breadth of Chamber's Pro-Business Agenda

The Chamber's biannual legislative ratings reflect a very active 2013-14, as it began to dawn on the legislature that the big issues facing Illinois cannot be ignored any longer. However, it approached those issues in a way that was too often contradictory and frustrating to employers.

Key roll calls in this year's ratings include important pieces of legislation that move Illinois towards reform of both state government and the business climate. Yet, they also include frustratingly counterproductive measures—such as votes on advisory referendums to raise the minimum wage and place a 3% income tax surcharge on small businesses making over \$1 million—that continue to send employers mixed messages about the direction of our state.

The Chamber rated more bills than usual due to the active nature of this legislature, but also because the Chamber secured the passage of a good number of its supported legislation.

- Procurement reform;
- Healthcare overhaul implementation;
- Employment law;
- Hydraulic fracturing;
- Sales tax sourcing;

The ratings also include votes on important governmental reforms to demonstrate that the business community will hold legislators of both parties accountable for reform of state government. Legislators that received the highest ratings this year demonstrated a commitment to employer issues but they also demonstrated a serious commitment to government reforms that are vital to turning our state and our economy around.

About the Illinois Chamber of Commerce Legislative Ratings

The ratings are based on legislators' votes on the key business legislation of the 97th General Assembly as determined by staff and the Chamber's Government Affairs Committee. The votes in the Senate and House are selected based on their impact on the business community. In cases where more than one roll call was taken on a bill, the vote that best demonstrates support for employers' vital interests was chosen. If employers are to change the culture in Springfield, they must educate themselves on the record of their representatives and hold them accountable for it.

The 2013-2014 Champions of Free Enterprise

The Illinois Chamber of Commerce is proud to recognize legislators that have made special contributions in the defense of free enterprise, and the furtherance of economic opportunities for Illinoisans. Legislators with Illinois Chamber ratings averaging 85% or better over the previous two General Assemblies have demonstrated their commitment to legislation that frees the entrepreneurial spirit and qualify for the award. SB 1—Pension Reform

Would reduce state employee pension benefits, but also includes system funding guarantees that would provide state funding relief by nearly \$140 billion over the next 30 years and reduce unfunded liability in the state's pension systems by nearly \$30 billion. Senate version offered state employees and retirees options between altering one set of pension/healthcare benefits in favor of keeping the other set of benefits intact (for example, taking a reduced pension cost-of-living increase in favor of keeping retiree healthcare benefits).

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 62-53-1

Senate Vote: 30-24-3

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 1715—Hydraulic Fracturing

Regulatory frame work that would authorize high volume horizontal hydraulic fracturing in Illinois. The legislation contains the strictest regulations in the nation. The Chamber's own analysis projects hydraulic fracturing will create tens of thousands of high-paying jobs, generate significant state revenue, and reduce energy costs for Illinois residents and businesses.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 108-9-0

Senate Vote: 52-3-4

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 1664—Telecommunications Act Reauthorization

Update of the Illinois Telecommunications Act to include increased investment in private broadband. Illinois' current law requires utilities to continue to invest in old technology. Negotiations will continue over the next two years to modernize the Act prior to the next expiration.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 117-0-0

Senate Vote: 59-0-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 1210—Houseless Bill of Rights

Precludes ability to deny certain rights to individuals based on housing status. This bill includes the right to maintain gainful employment, to access emergency medical care, and the right to vote on the same basis as others.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 76-33-0

Senate Vote: 48-7-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 1912—Statutory Requirements for Monetary Settlements

Legislation that would enact statutory requirements on the time-frame and delivery of monetary settlements in civil lawsuits. Concerns from the business community surrounded a lack of protection against plaintiffs suing again for the same injury and possible double payment of any unsettled liens on the settlement money.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 67-50-1

Senate Vote: 40-13-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

HB 2649—New Liabilities for Misclassifying Workers

Amends the Illinois Employee Classification Act (ECA) to clarify certain procedural processes by the Illinois Department of Labor regarding allegations of “misclassified” employees as independent contractors. The legislation also reduces penalties from \$1,500 per violation to \$1,000 for first violators and from \$2,500 to \$2,000 per violation for repeat violators. The legislation proposes to provide for the individual liability of corporate officers and agents.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 67-49-1

Senate Vote: 34-20-1

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 2758—Auto IRA

Creates a state run retirement savings program in the form of an automatic enrollment payroll deduction IRA for private sector employees and places a new mandate on employers without retirement programs to provide the state-run program to its employees.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: Did Not Come Up for a Vote in the House

Senate Vote: 30-22-2

Outcome: Passed the Senate, did not come up for a vote in the House.

HB 924—Prevailing Wage Requirements for Local Projects

Puts in place new requirements for private contractors to be able to bid on government contracts. Companies would now have to participate in an apprenticeship training program for employees entering trade fields, provide proof of extensive insurance coverage, and maintain an Illinois office as the primary place of employment for employees working on the bid.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 60-50-3

Senate Vote: Did Not Come Up for a Vote in the Senate

Outcome: Passed the House, but did not receive a vote in the Senate.

HB 2590—Workplace Violence Prevention

Chamber initiative allows an employer to seek an order of protection to prohibit further violence or threats of violence by a person if: 1. An employee has suffered unlawful violence or a credible threat of violence from the person; and 2. The unlawful violence has been carried out at the employer's place of work or the credible threat of violence can reasonably be constructed to be carried out at the employee's place of work by the person.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 107-0-0

Senate Vote: 58-0-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

HB 1379—Illinois Water Systems Viability Act

Allows large public utility companies that are acquiring a water or sewer utility an alternative way to establish the ratemaking rate base. Additionally the Commission's order that approves the acquisition must include the Commission's decision establishing the ratemaking rate base of the water or sewer utility and the district or tariff group with which the water or sewer utility will be combined for ratemaking purposes.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 77-31-0

Senate Vote: 49-2-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

HB 3223—New Prevailing Wage Recording Keeping Requirements

Makes amendments to the Wage Act. Requires contractors to record the gross and net wage, hourly overtime rate, fringe benefit rates, and the sponsor and administrator of fringe benefit plans. Additionally, it allows the Department of Labor to require electronic filing.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 68-38-1

Senate Vote: 35-19-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 26—Medicaid Expansion

Extends coverage of the State's medical assistance program to individuals aged 19 to 65 who under the current Code are not eligible for medical assistance, who qualify for medical assistance under Social Security Act, and who have income at or below 133% of the federal poverty level. Expansion is funded by the federal government and will keep Illinois employers from facing more than \$100 million in fines under the Affordable Care Act.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 63-55-0

Senate Vote: 39-20-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 346—MPC Extension

Reforms the EDGE Tax Credit program and extends the Manufacturers' Purchase Credit. Allows small businesses with less than 100 employees to apply for the EDGE Tax Credit. Previously small businesses had to invest a minimum of \$1 million in the business to be eligible, however applicants will now have to affirm that completion of the project will not take place unless they receive the credit.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 107-4-0

Senate Vote: Did Not Come Up for a Vote in the Senate.

Outcome: Passed the House, but did not come up for a vote in the Senate.

HB 3816—Small Business Income Tax Increase Referendum

Puts in place a referendum asking if a 3 percent income tax surcharge should be placed on small business owners and other entrepreneurs with income over \$1 million.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 64-46-0

Senate Vote: 33-17-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 2612—Sales Tax Sourcing

Amends the various sales tax acts to provide local tax sourcing guidelines for over-the-counter sales, vending machine sales, and sales of minerals. It also establishes a Use and Occupation Tax Reform Task Force for the purpose of studying how to modernize the state sales tax. The Task Force is required to report to the Governor and General Assembly no later than January 1, 2016.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 76-38-1

Senate Vote: 44-12-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Sent to Governor for Signature.

SB 1922—Chicago Public Pension Reform

Bill aimed at making pensions more economically viable. Proposes increases in employee and employer contributions and a reduction in retiree cost-of-living adjustments for the Chicago Municipal Employees' Annuity & Benefit Fund and Chicago Laborers' Annuity & Benefit Fund.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 73-41-1

Senate Vote: 31-23-2

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 3287—New Provisions Regarding Workers' Com. Safety Consultants

Provides immunity to service organization that are wholly owned by the employer or the employer's insurer or broker and that provides safety service, advice, or recommendations. Strips safety consultants of liability protections under workers compensation. Will increase lawsuits against these consultants, increasing their costs, and increasing counter suits against employers that hire them.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 64-49-3

Senate Vote: 35-19-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

HB 3814—\$10 Minimum Wage Advisory Referendum

Despite already having the highest minimum wage in the Midwest, the General Assembly placed an advisory referendum on the ballot asking for yet another job killing increase.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 71-43-0

Senate Vote: 39-17-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Public Act.

SB 3405—Patent Trolling

Makes certain claims regarding patent infringement unlawful. Prohibits claims that falsely threaten adverse administrative or judicial action, lack a reasonable basis in fact or law, or that come from an individual that is not, or does not represent, the person with a current right to license the patent.

Chamber Position: Support

House Vote: 114-0-1

Senate Vote: 57-0-0

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Sent to Governor for Signature.

HB 390—Closure of “Corporate Tax Loopholes”

Aimed to close corporate tax loopholes. This bill includes removing tax-breaks such as taxing foreign dividends, decoupling from Federal Domestic Activities Production Credit, repealing the Non-combination Rule. In effect a \$450 million tax increase on Illinois employers.

Chamber Position: Oppose

House Vote: 49-65-0

Senate Vote: Did Not Come Up for a Vote in the Senate.

Outcome: House vote failed, was not taken up again.

HB 5491—Procurement Reform

Chamber initiated legislation that amends the Procurement Code, the Small Business Contracts Act, the Governmental Joint Purchasing Act and the Discriminatory Club Act. The legislation is intended to provide for a more expedited procurement process while preserving transparency. Further, the legislation provides streamlining and clarification, as well as statutory clean-up. Among many other changes, the legislation increases the small business thresholds, allows for electronic submissions (rather than physical) regarding some requirements, and clarifies several definitional terms and references.

Outcome: Passed both Houses, Sent to Governor for Signature.
