Quarantine Change—Move From 96 to 24 Hours

When COVID-19 first hit, the science community assumed that, like other viruses, there would be a high risk of transmission from touch, and if there is one thing Libraries are known for, it is our high volume of materials constantly changing hands. Based on advice from REALM, Public Health Agencies, and the national library community, we have been quarantining items returned to us for 96 hours before putting them back on the shelves. However, as more information has come to light about

COVID-19 and the low risk of transmission that comes from touching surfaces, as well as updated policies from Public Health Agencies - including our own in Plumas County - and the Library community, we are decreasing our quarantine time to 24 hours starting April 12th.
